

Primary Literacy

Listen to our founding legends recounted by our fully trained costumed guides and let your students decide whether they think the stories are fact or fiction.

Hear the tales of King Arthur recounted by our Storyteller and see how the stories fit in with the local landscape.

Come and hear about St. Dunstan, a 'local boy' who is said to have battled the devil as a monk here, and was also a highly important advisor to royalty. Learn about his relevance that still remains today.

Pilgrims still travel here to see the Holy Thorn tree, which can be seen in flower each spring and winter. Listen to the tale of how it is said it came to be here.

Early Years

Our costumed guides are able to tell the stories of the Abbey so that they are accessible to younger children.

- Try one of our trails. Accept the quest to find the Holy Grail or take Brother Bear's Grounds and Garden Trail.
- Use the museum spotter quiz to help your class look closely at the artefacts.
- Let our Storyteller inspire their imagination.
- Create a stunning wax resist image using our collection of replica memorial plaques.

GCSE History

We will help your students gain understanding of Glastonbury Abbey in a wider historical context, and the Abbey's place in local and national history.

This full immersion day includes 'interviews' with our costumed guides to help with understanding why people would have different views on what is happening around them and also the opportunity to understand and assess the sources of interpretation of the site.

Primary Saxon or King Arthur Day

The 'Meet the Saxon' session may include:

A day in the life of a Saxon –
Looking at personal and household items, food, clothing and how they lived

Work and daily activity –
How you can tell if someone is rich or poor.

Shopping at the market –
What you are able to buy cost of items, value of money.

Return home in the evening –
How did they spend their leisure time. What games did they play? Compare evening activities today with those in Saxon times.

Meet King Arthur –
Learn what life was like in his time and what his connection is to Glastonbury Abbey. Why did people believe in King Arthur? Indeed many people believe in him today! Why did King Edward I and his wife, Queen Eleanor think it was important for them to come and place his bones in a grand tomb?



Awareness, Mystery and Value

Reception & KS1 - We can help your class discover why some stories are special and why some people thought belonging to a faith community was important to them.

KS2 - You and your class can have a full day here to build on why people make pilgrimages or special journeys, including activities to reinforce their learning.

KS3 – The abbey is an ideal place to look at the impact that religion and belief had on the local community and the surrounding area.

Discover our links to key periods in local and national history.

A day here will contain:

- An interactive session in Abbot's Kitchen, tailored to the historical period you are studying and the age/ability of your class.
- Short tours showing different aspects of the site with a costumed guide who is trained and experienced in working with children.
- Trails and worksheets to enable your class to explore at their own pace.
- An Outdoor Classroom as your base for the day.
- Practical hands-on activities to help children to engage with the life and times of the people they are studying.

Design and Technology KS2

Using the Medieval Kitchen Garden - learn about medieval garden design and seasonality of produce. Then look at the Abbot's Kitchen for changes in kitchen technology.

What was life like after 1066?

How did the Norman Conquest change the abbey, the lives of the monks and the life of people on the abbey estates? Would you be on the side of the Saxons or the Norman newcomers? Learn what happened to the monks here.

Activities to enhance our Curriculum

For KS1 and KS2:

Choose **two** activities to be included in your day from our menu. All activities are designed to be inclusive and each session lasts for 40 minutes each, accommodating a maximum of 20 children in each session.



- Try 'Taking the Vow', with children dressed in monks' robes learning a little about what the life of a novice entailed, then listen to the sound of silence as they process into the grounds, enabling you to have a group photo opportunity.
- Look at Anglo Saxon Chronicles. Learn how the monks made books with 'Quills & Spills' as children try to write with a quill and illuminate their work.
- Make a pilgrim badge as part of your Pilgrimage focus day. The day will also help children understand the differences in medieval beliefs and values, helping them to empathise with people from that time.
- Learn about Medieval Health & Hygiene whilst making a salve for toothache and learning about some of the more 'revolting' aspects of medieval life.
- Meet a Saxon or King Arthur session will count as one of these choices if you wish to include this.

How to book

If you are interested in bringing your class for a day at the Abbey, please contact the Learning Team who will be pleased to discuss how best to suit your needs. We ask that schools book six weeks prior to their requested visit date.

We can cater for groups of all sizes from 10 to 90 and will consult with you to create a timetable for your day with us. The site is reasonably accessible and a risk assessment can be obtained on request.

We offer a free orientation visit for teachers thinking of bringing their students here, which can also include a meeting with Julie Hayes in order that we are able to ensure that your day fulfils your requirements.

Facilities

The Abbey ruins are set in 36 acres of parkland. We have covered space available for schoolchildren which is close to the washroom facilities. An extensive apple orchard, two ponds and a Wildlife Walkway are all available for you to access.

There is drop-off parking in the car park next to the abbey and coach bays in Northload Street.
